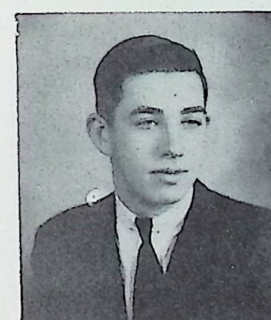
IRVIN ARTHUR COUTU

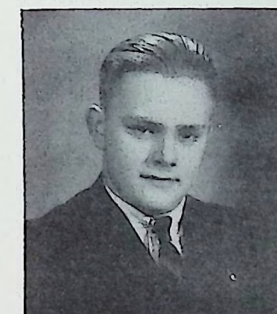
BRIAN FINLAY MILNE

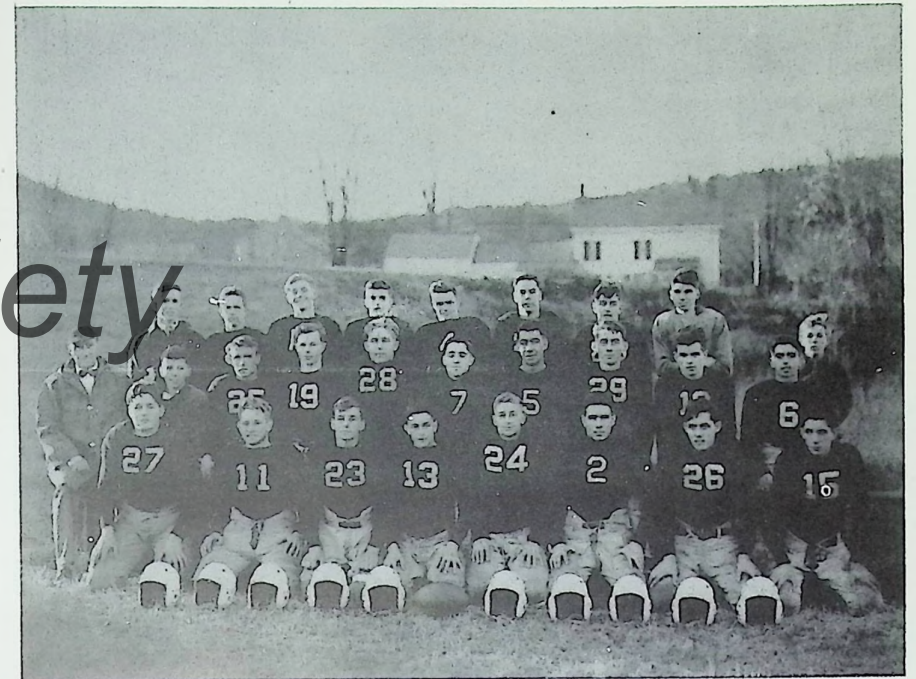

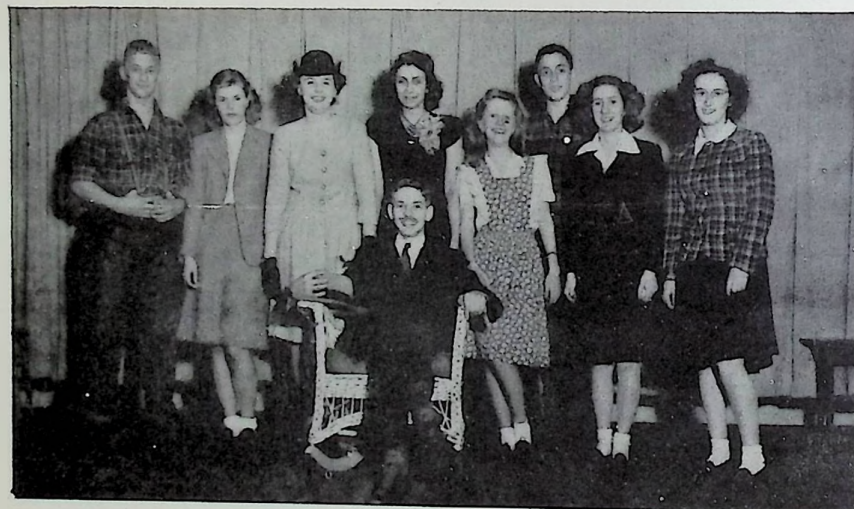
WHAT PRICE AMERICA

FUTURE FARMERS

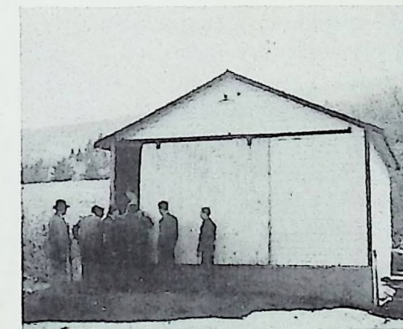

In spite of some changes in the program the French Club had a very active and successful year under the guidance of its advisor, Miss Chase.

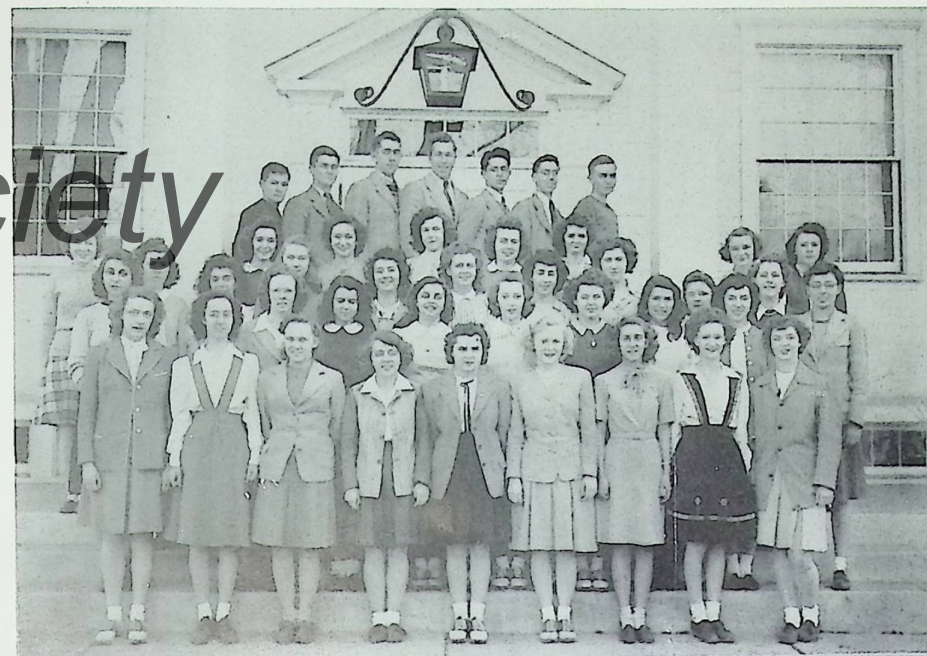

SQUIRREL HUNTIN'

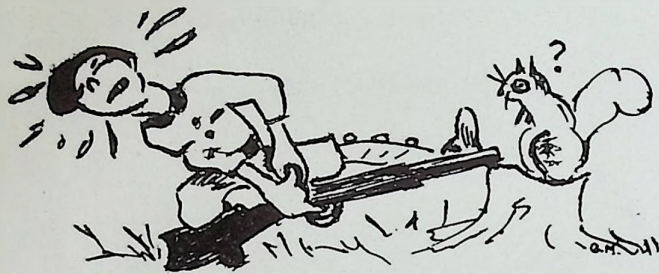
