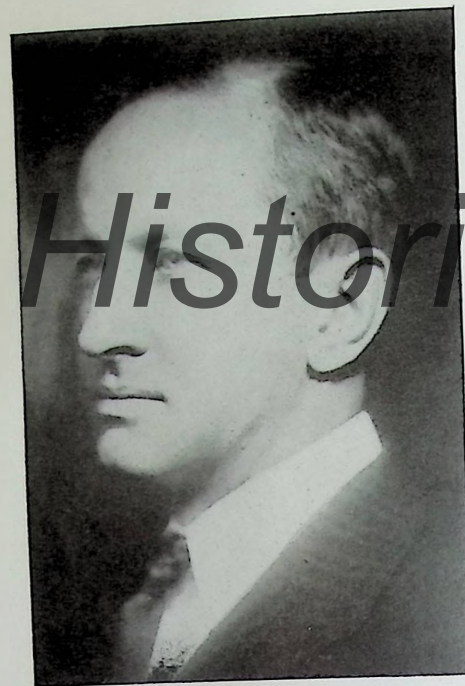

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The Editors tell me that the theme of this book is "The Atomic World." A good many of us wonder what that will be like.

Hunting is one of the sports best suited to this region because there are forests everywhere you look. Deer, bear, and moose are just common everyday sights. At night if somebody hears a catfight on his backporch, he never knows whether it is his cats fighting or a couple of wildcats. Porcupines are so thick that everyone has to wear steel soled shoes so they won't get quills in their feet.

Trout fishing is another good sport found in this section because there are so many small brooks and rivers. It is nothing to catch your limit and more every day. Brooks run so near to some houses that people can open a window and get fresh fish for breakfast while they still lie in bed. I know of one house where the river runs right through the cellar all the time. The people who live there can go down cellar and float around on a cider barrel and catch fresh trout anytime. Some of the best fishing holes that I know of have trout in them big enough so that one fish will feed a whole community.

Skiing is another favorite pastime around here. There are so many hills you can ski anywhere. In the winter time the snow will drift behind the buildings and the skiers can use the drifts for ski jumps. In some places there are two steep hills with a valley between them. Skiers can go down one hill and get going so fast that they coast right up the other hill. Then they can turn around and do the same thing the other way. If they want to, they can ski all day without any work at all.

Also in the winter time there is skating. This is another good sport here because there are so many brooks and rivers. There are also some ponds and lakes to be used for skating. Some skaters will go over frozen falls in the rivers just as if they were ski jumping. When the travel gets too bad in the winter, you can skate from one town to another on the brooks just as if you were in Holland. One time the crust froze so hard you could skate anywhere.

If you are a sportsman this region is the place to live because it's a sportsman's heaven.

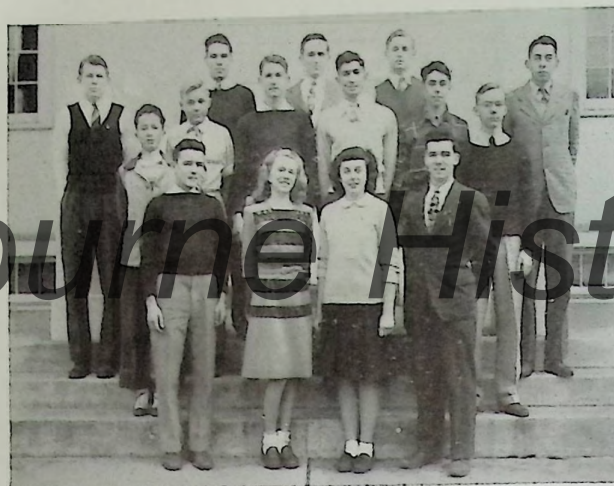
Here They Come!

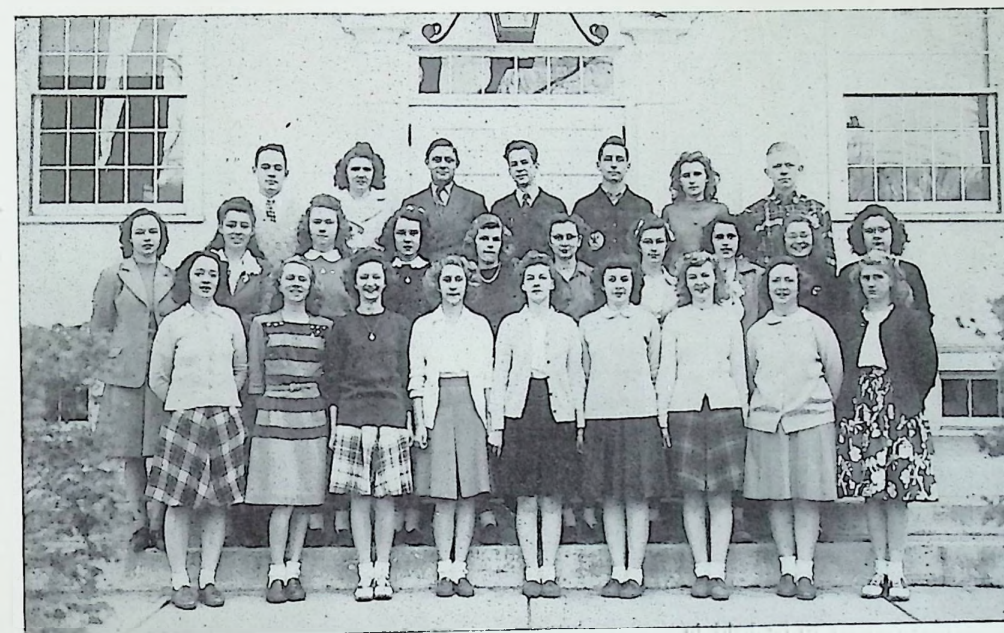
LIBRARY

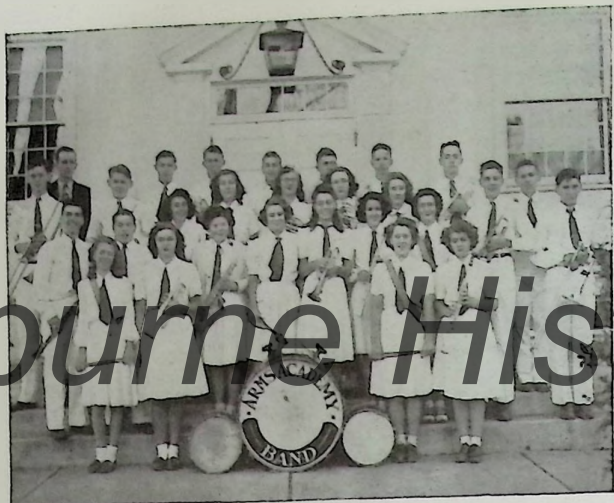

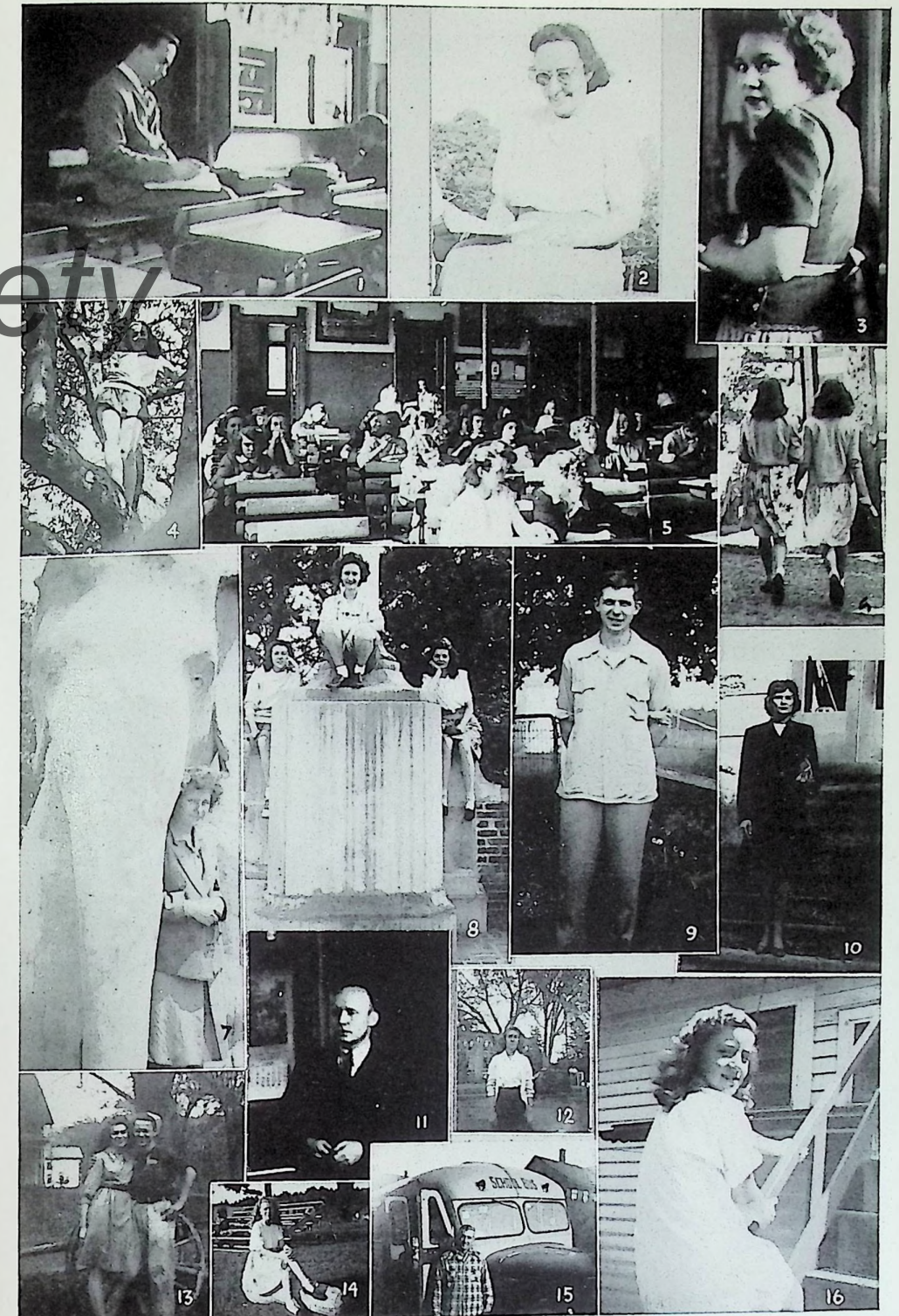

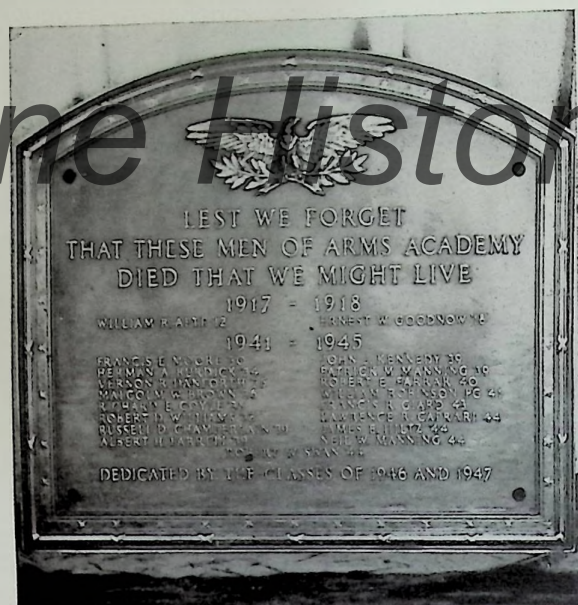

ALUMNI



A Fitting Memorial



Last spring the class of 1946 voted that its gift to the school should be the bronze memorial tablet pictured above. A quick study of circulars put out by reputable manufacturers showed that the funds which the class had for this purpose would not be sufficient, so the class of 1947 also voted that its gift to the school when it graduated would be a sum of money which could be used for this tablet. With an equally generous contribution from each class, enough money was available for a good tablet. A design was selected by a committee of the two classes. Another committee composed of the members of the Pro Merito Society in these two classes made a study of inscriptions which appeared from time to time on similar tablets, and it composed the inscription which is now on the tablet. The tablet was cast from solid bronze and was finished by one of the best manufacturers of precious and semi-precious metals in the country. At the Armistice Day assembly this tablet was presented to the school and dedicated by officers of the two classes. It was unveiled by Florence and Phyllis Chamberlain of the freshman class whose brother, Russell D. Chamberlain, was the first man from the school, first from the town, and first from this county to lose his life in the war. The tablet is now mounted in the main room of the Academy building on the front wall in the southeast corner.

ALUMNI SERVICE MEMORIAL

While the war was still on, a committee of alumni, one from each class from 1920 to 1944, undertook the task of collecting a fund for some suitable tribute to the Arms men and women who served in the war. The committee did its work well, and the fund now stands at nine hundred and some dollars.

The alumni now have two more tasks to accomplish. One is to determine the form of the memorial tribute and the other is to find out what other names, if any, are to be added to the five hundred and thirty-eight now on our list. They are by no means sure that they have them all.

ALUMNI ATHLETIC FUND

In the spring of 1946, a committee of interested alumni began raising money for athletic equipment at the school. Uniforms of all kinds have been wearing out during the war when it was impossible to get replacements, and the income of the student association has been so low that money could not be accumulated against the time when new outfits would be available. These contributions came to a total of \$1,577.50. Part of this money has been used. A complete new set of baseball uniforms was purchased. There was a small amount of good materials on the market. As the old uniforms are good for several seasons in practice, these new suits should take care of us for some time to come. During the summer and fall, football goods came onto the market, and pants, pads, jerseys, and helmets were purchased. While this material is not quite so heavy as some that was purchased before the war, it is reasonably good and should last for some time. There is still money available for basketball uniforms for both boys and girls, but these were not purchased during the 1947 season because the quality of goods on the market was poor and the prices were high; also, the old uniforms, except for appearance, were good for another season. We hope to get these next year.

An interesting item is that the colors of all the new goods were in scarlet and white instead of the maroon and white which has been in use for a number of years. Many people still like the richer appearance of the maroon, but all our coaches have for several years complained of what the air force pilots called "Poor Visibility"; and with the brighter shade of red it is far easier to spot a team mate down the football field or across the basketball court.

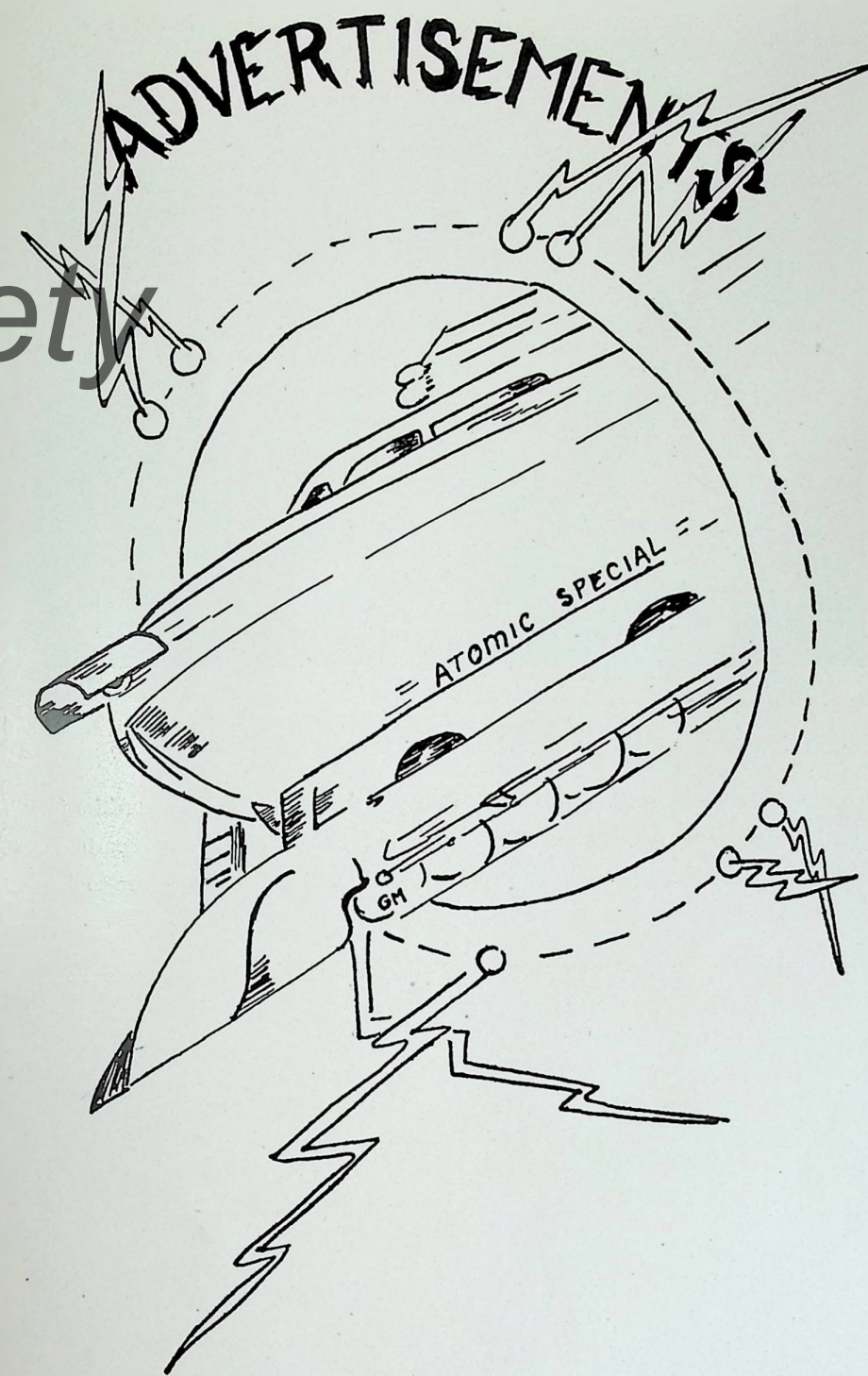
