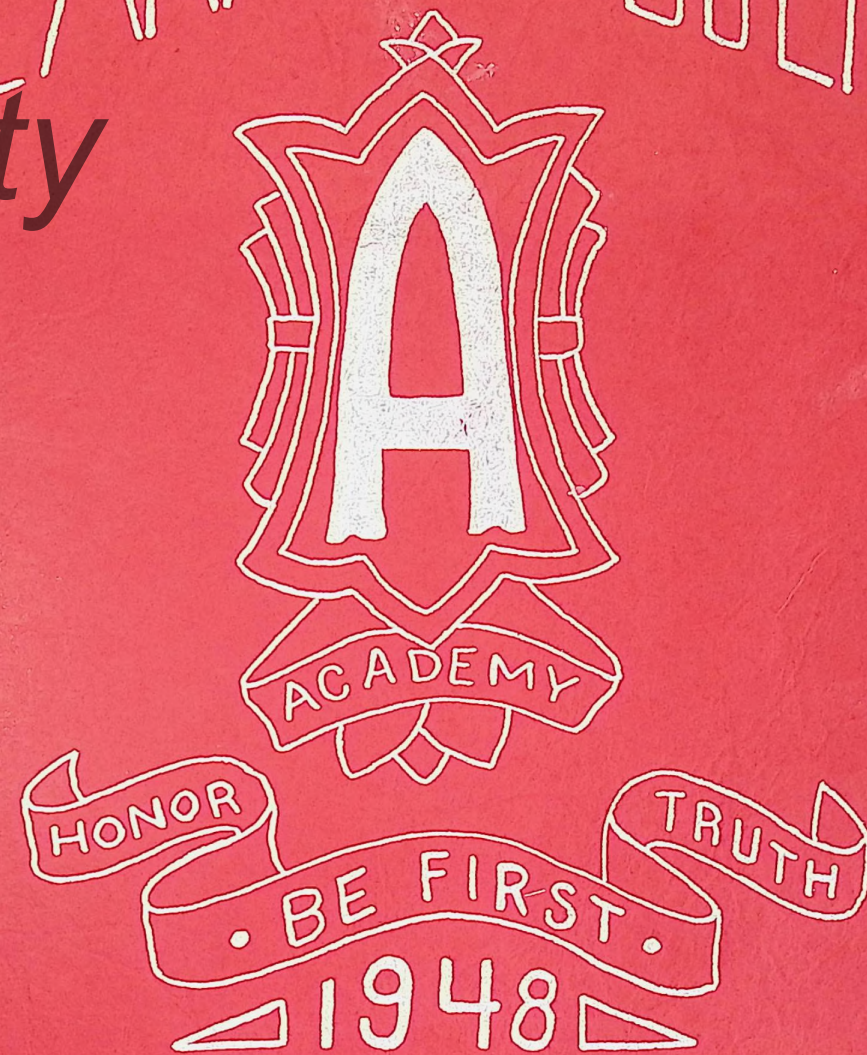

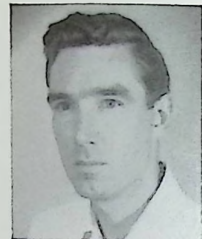

In the making of a yearbook, hard work is required from many departments. This work is done more or less quietly, and many perhaps do not realize what

planning, coordination, and plain hard work it demands.

The Editorial Board does a good share of the work, collecting write-ups and articles, pictures, and planning the lay-out of the yearbook. The Business Board does its share by typing the written material and by soliciting the ads which help to finance the "Student." The student body also helps by bringing in snapshots for our pages of personal snaps.

The Art Department, part of the Editorial Board, has a job which requires skill and originality. This year the art work, like the other features of the book, carried out our theme "Be First!"

Our theme—"Be First!"—is a good one which can be adopted by the whole school as well as by the yearbook. We have tried to bring you a good yearbook this year. It has taken thought, time, and effort. We hope that it will be successful and will "Be First" among our past yearbooks.

BE FIRST

Not everyone can be first in the sense of being the top man. That is impossible, but all can strive to be first in various ways that best suit their particular abilities. In our modern times few people will stop and look out for the other fellow; people do no more usually than is absolutely necessary. To change this someone must adopt the contrary idea of being helpful and teaching others by setting the example. If a class, for instance, took "Be First" as a motto, and lived up to it, others would soon follow suit.

In what ways might one or a group be first? In regard to people living together, be first to recognize your mistakes, admit your faults, be first to correct them and apologize for something you have done wrong to injure the feelings of others.

Many people act too quickly and rashly. First carefully consider the problem at hand. After systematically reasoning out arguments for and against, choose what is better and right.

Often brilliant ideas are wasted because they are not expressed. Later someone else expresses your very thought and receives the credit. Be first to suggest improvements; be first to accept helpful criticism. A wise man receives instruction and is yet wiser; a fool despises instruction to his own hurt.

Be first to pay class dues, A.A.S.A. dues, subscription for the *Sentinel*, etc. Do work without being told a second time. Do not be satisfied with mediocrity. Have the initiative to do things without direct supervision of a teacher in preparation for after-school life. Volunteer money, time, and energy for a cause that is good in your opinion.

In being first, however, regard the rights of others. Refrain from the customary pushing to enter a bus or building. Abhor the ruthless competition in everyday life, sports, in business, and international affairs simply be first. Be first to practice the golden rule; love thy neighbor as thyself.

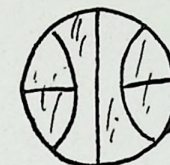
FOOTBALL

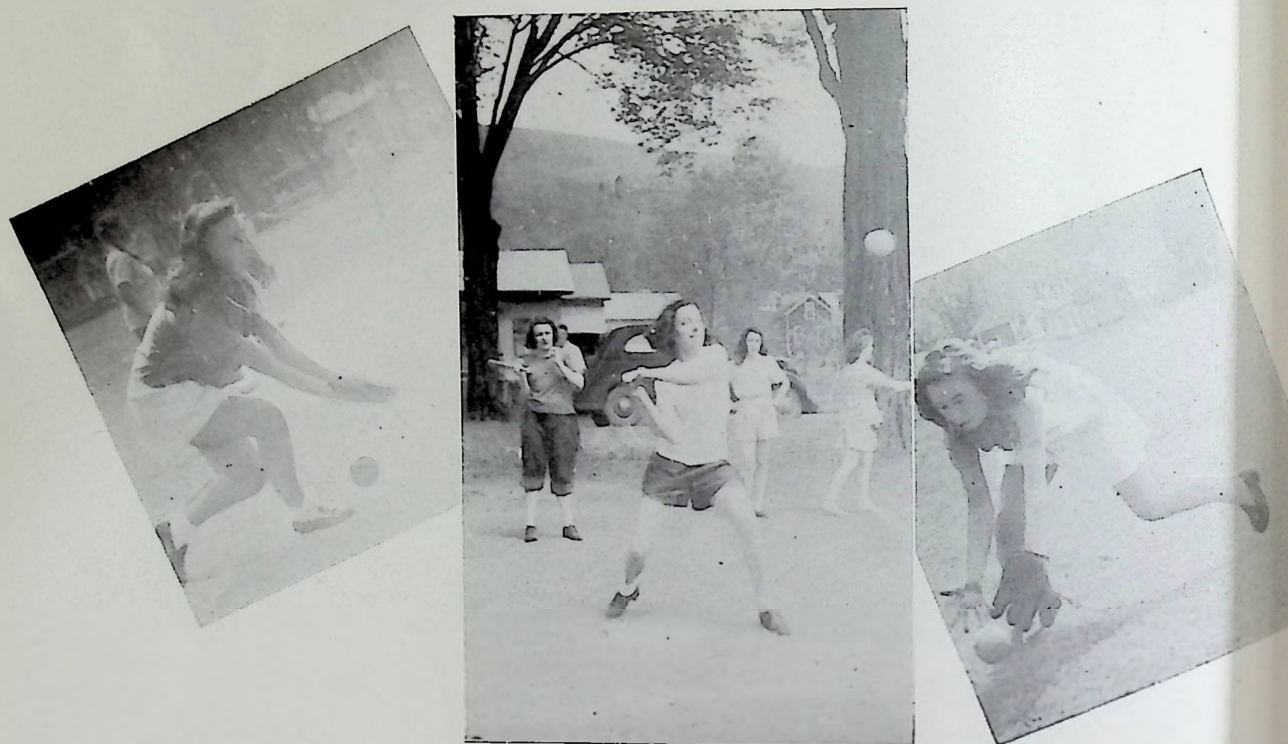

FRENCH CLUB

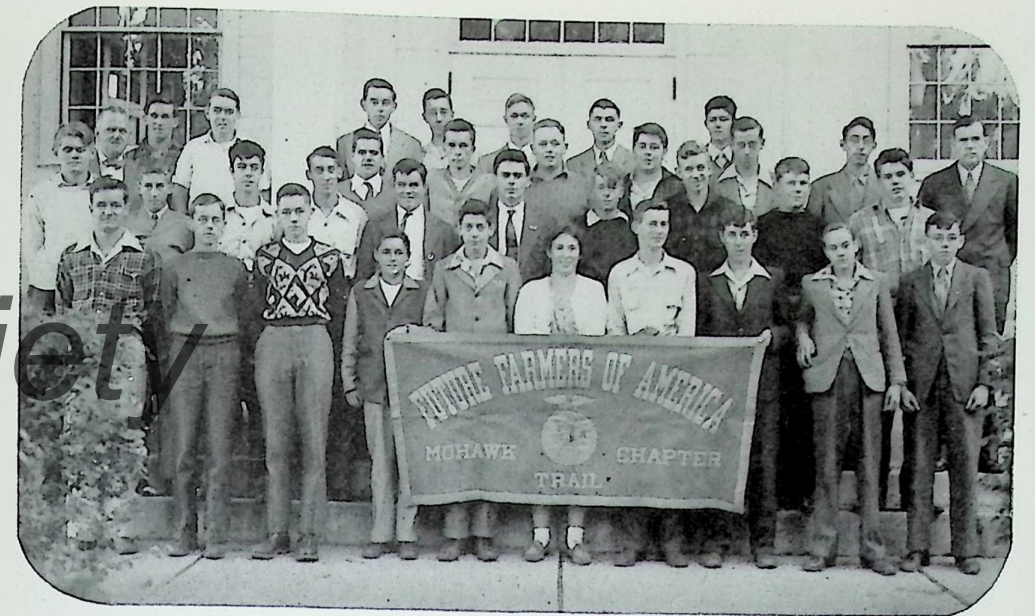

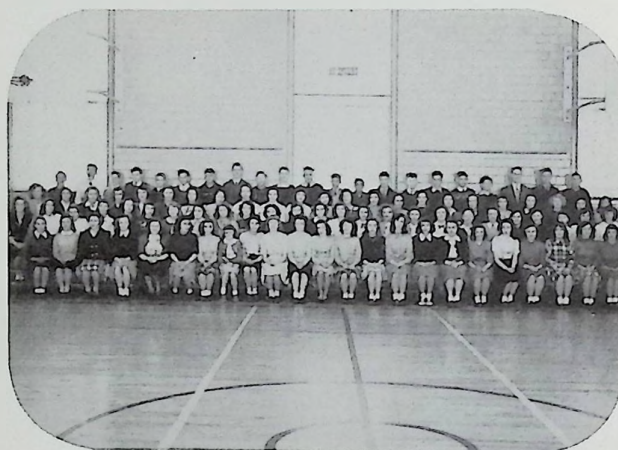
Chorus

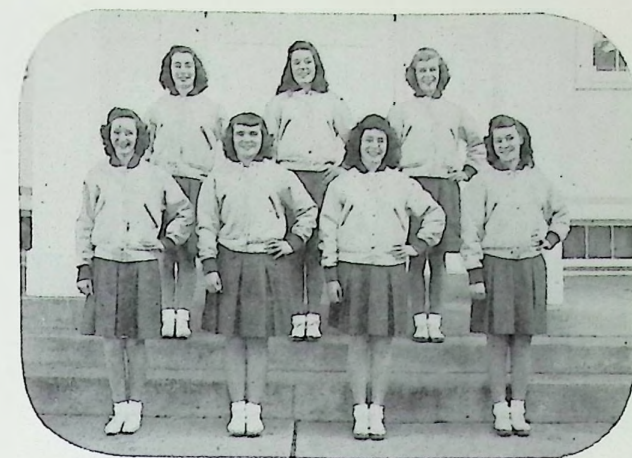
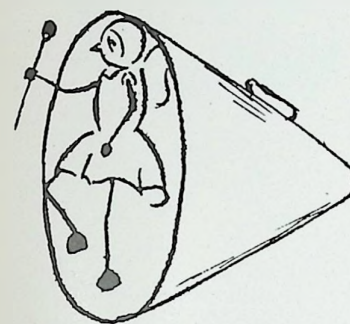
This spring many attended the "Pop Concerts" under the direction of Wheeler Beckett.

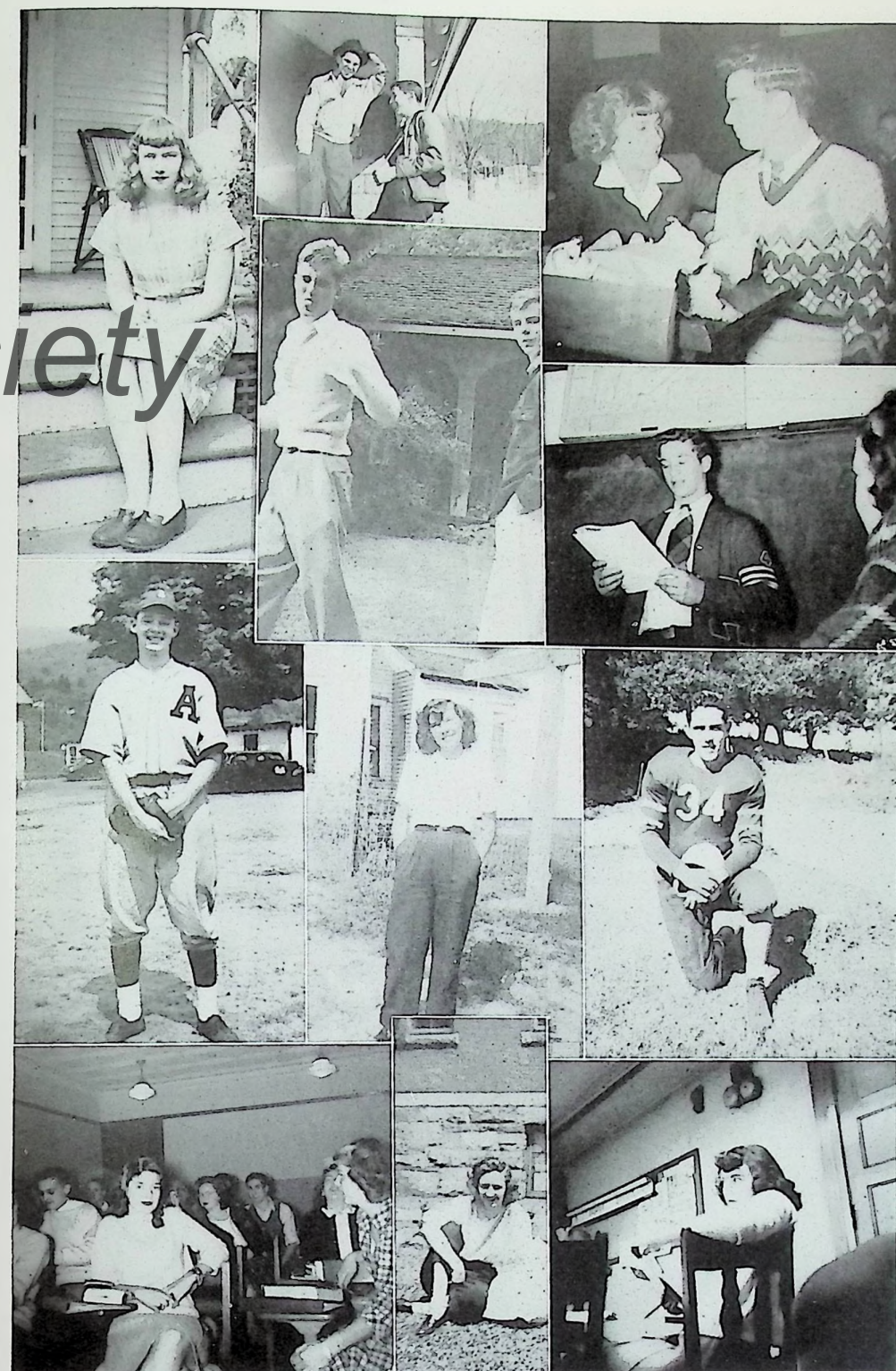
Senior Play "Feathers In A Gale"

Her last remark I happen to hear.

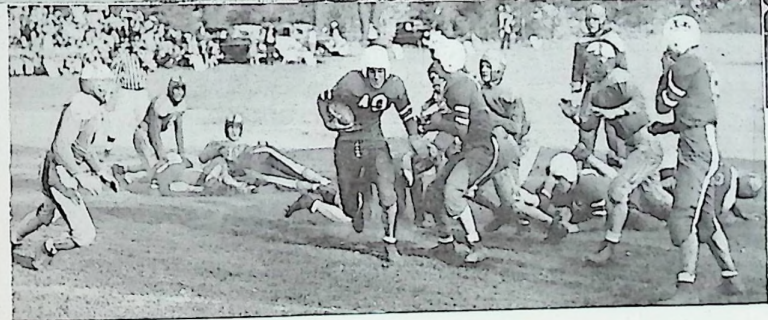
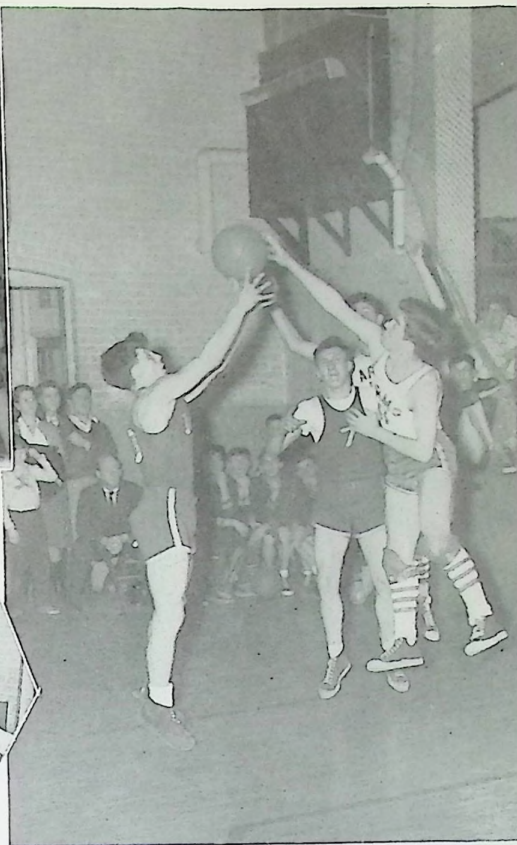
