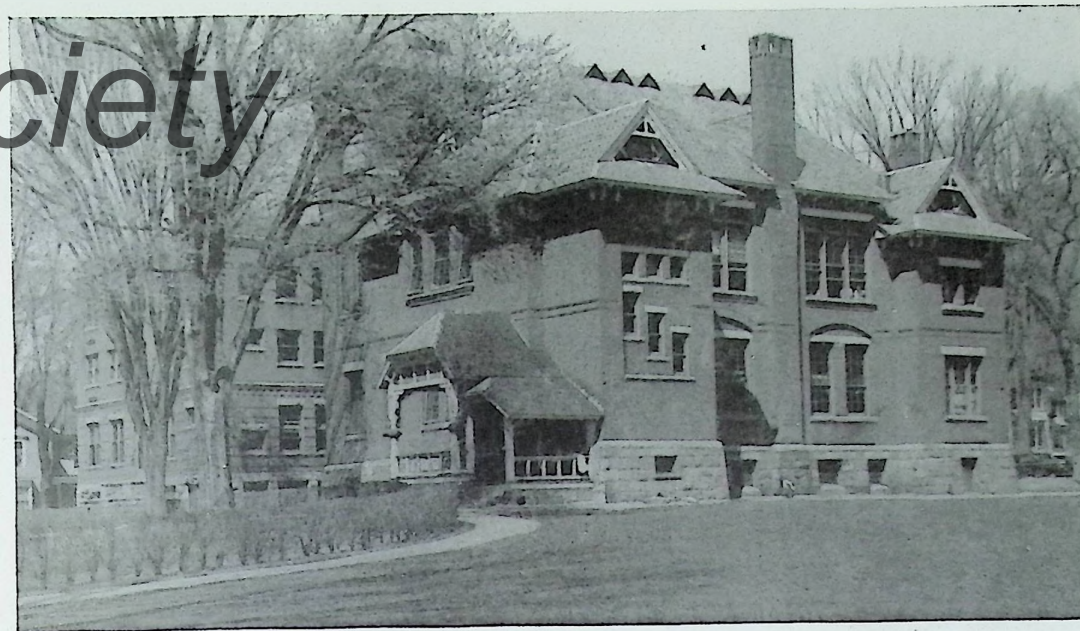

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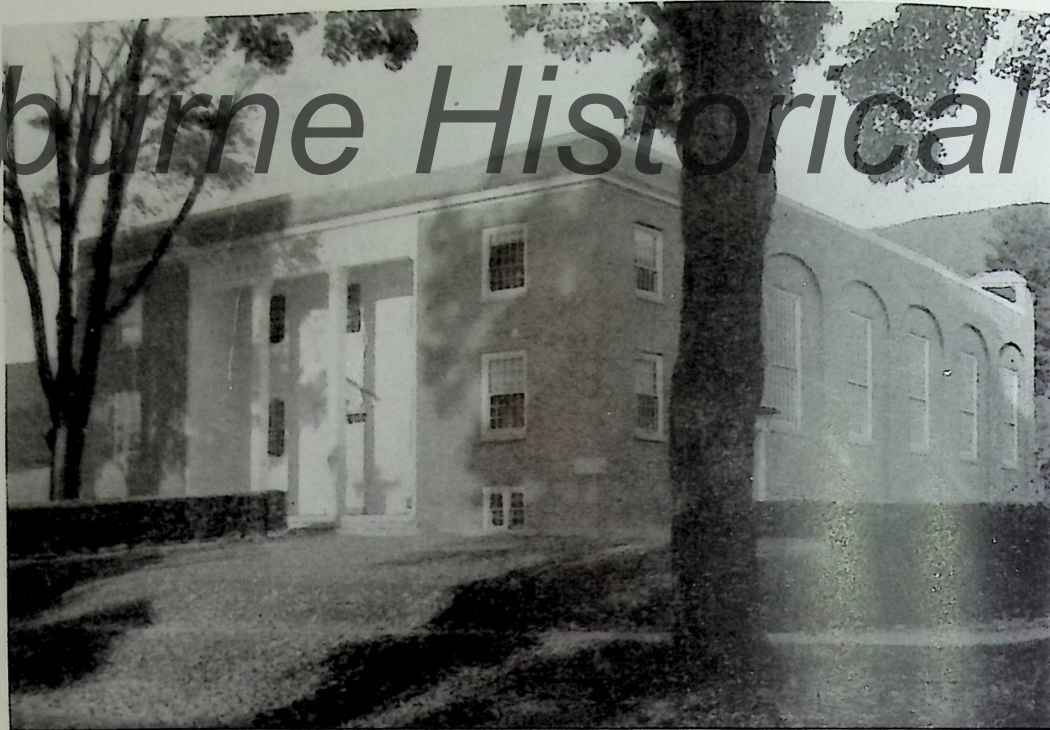

## FOREWORD

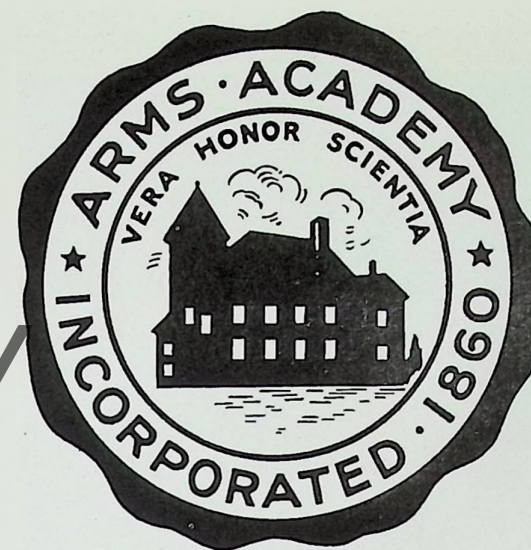
The Spirit of '49

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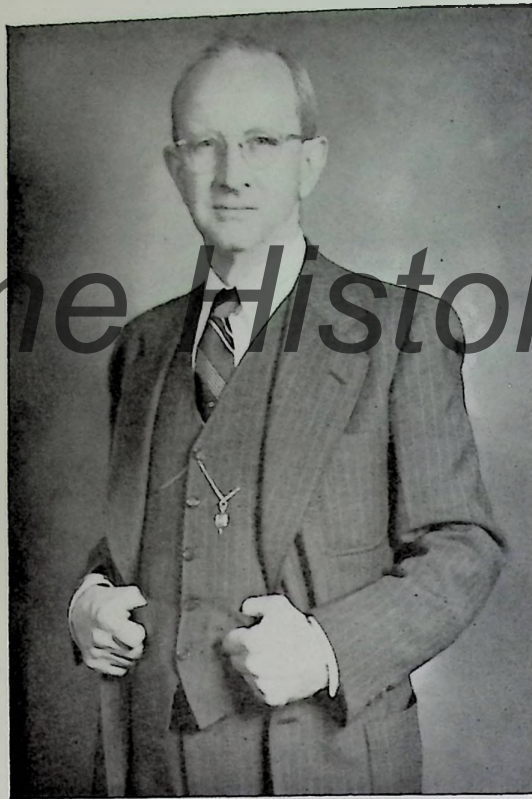


## DEDICATION

If the members of this class will carry this spirit with them as they leave, and remember the satisfaction of sharing with each other their work and play, their troubles and their happiness, their cares and even their pocketbooks, they will do their part toward making this world a better place for us all.

## The Story Of Arms Academy

"Hey, you kids! The school's on fire!"

It was hard to believe, but I ran outside that April day in 1948. Sure enough, smoke and flames were pouring out of the old building. But Arms came through, just as it had many times before. Since I had become interested in the school, I began asking my parents how it had been founded.

Our family, having a strong tendency toward Baptist ideas, got in on the first attempt to start a high school in town. The Baptists had decided to start a school, the Franklin Academy, for the Baptist young people in the county. The Academy was built on the Colrain Road between ten and twenty years after the War of 1812. It was three stories high, the tallest building in the county. My great-grandpop, Otis Greig, enrolled right away; his girl-friend, Fedelia Adams, came in soon afterward. They lived at home or boarded in town while they were at school, but there was a dorm for the out-of-town kids. This building was about where our gym is now.

The Franklin Academy was pretty popular. Students (or scholars, as they were called) came from Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, New York, Mississippi, and even London. Although the Academy was well-attended and had a farm to support it, there were financial difficulties. Soon the school closed, and we Greigs were out of education again.

The town opened the Academy later, but under a new name — the Shelburne Falls Academy. Folks thought they had everything fixed, but this school had the same trouble as the other — no cash. After it closed, the building was used as an Arms Academy dorm, then as a factory, and now it's an apartment house.

There was a little money left over, and Major Ira Arms, a Greenfieldite who had settled in town, had given twenty thousand dollars and some land on Severance Street to start a school. Thus was incorporated the Arms Academy Association. The school was opened in 1880, but before, when there had been no school here, my grandpop, William Greig, like many other town students, went to Powers Institute in Bernardston.

Arms Academy started as a typical New England academy, run by trustees and requiring tuition from the pupils. The first graduation took place in 1885, although students had graduated before then. My great-uncle, Herbert Greig, had been one of these; like most, he was about twenty when he finished. Kids in those days had to work a couple of years to earn the money to go to school.

About fifteen years later Arms Academy began serving as the high school for the town of Shelburne. In those days the old building, the only building, was divided into many more rooms than it is now, and the assembly room was upstairs. Arms didn't have a school yearbook and a school paper then. There was just the "Student," which came out four times a year.

The kids who went to school were full of the "old Harry." About the time my uncle, Carlton P. Greig, was here, there was one genius who strung wires under the floor where no one could see them. By putting two ends together as he sat at his desk he could ring a bell behind the register. After this had happened a few times during the prayer, the faculty members were boiling mad. They were practically nervous wrecks before they found the wires.

Some of the customs that were popular in years back have gone out of existence. Dad tells about one that he didn't like as a freshman, but he seemed to change his mind when he became an upper-classman. It was considered necessary for the upperclassmen to throw every freshman boy into a big watering-trough outside the building. This custom was abolished because it was considered rather hard on the freshmen.

When the Academy was started it was a prep school. Just before the First World War folks decided a few practical subjects were needed, so they added the household arts and agriculture courses. Then things started to get crowded in the academy building. The assembly hall upstairs was made into three classrooms, and still there wasn't enough room. So in 1916, trustees built Science Hall containing a gym upstairs, a science lab on the first floor, and household arts rooms in the basement. The boys' and girls' locker rooms were on the second and third floors. Everyone thought the problem was solved for good. They soon learned differently — teachers couldn't make themselves heard downstairs whenever there was a gym class on the second floor.

Class rivalry was keener twenty years ago than it is today. Each class had a banner, and at the Senior Reception the senior banner was hung from one of the rafters in the gym. Then the juniors would try to steal it. When the contest developed into a free-for-all, it was discontinued.

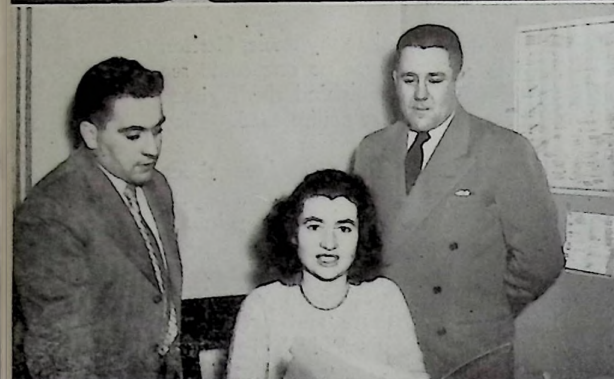
At various times courses such as music, art, commercial, and shop, have been added to the school curriculum until Arms now offers a wide variety: college preparatory, commercial agriculture, household arts-commercial, general, household arts, and shop.

In 1936, the Cowell Gym was completed; it was built and owned by the town. The present arrangement is that the gym is owned by the town, while the academy building and Science Hall are owned by the Arms Academy Association. The town rents these buildings from the trustees. The school itself is run by the town of Shelburne, which pays tuition for town pupils, buys supplies, etc. The out-of-town pupils' tuition is paid by the towns from which the students come.

There are many Arms traditions which have been handed down by the succeeding classes. Every

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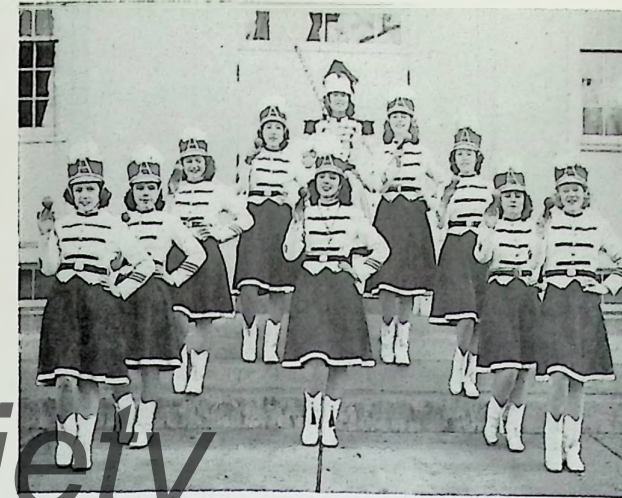
