



Our Editors, like so many others, are emphasizing the changes of a half-century and ask me to do the same. The half-century will not end until next December thirty-first, but that is near enough.


A glance at the ARMS STUDENTS of 1900 and 1901 shows a change. Those books contained only the literary efforts of the pupils. Modern year books, for better or worse, contain no such articles whatever — only write-ups about the profuse and profusely-pictured “activities”.


In 1900 the activities were baseball for the boys and little else. The athletics, clubs, school newspaper and other items listed here have all been added since. They have their value.

In 1900 there was an academic curriculum with a few electives. Such pupils as came to the Academy took it and either passed and were graduated or failed and dropped out. Since then, business training, household arts, agriculture and shop work have been added without weakening the academic work. It is assumed that if a pupil cannot do well in one line, he can do better in another, and he has a chance to try it. A splendid improvement; Arms has kept abreast of the times, has pioneered in some important matters, and has avoided flashy fads.


For the next half-century the Academy will be in the hands of its present pupils, their recent predecessors, and those to come. Let us hope that they will exercise the same wisdom as those who have been in charge since 1900 and before.







These are but a few of the score of accomplishments credited to the 1949-50 Student Council. Father Time must feel proud and satisfied that the half-century has ended on such a successful note.









Some of the girls continued their work by providing a hot meal at noon for the women teachers. They also sold hot dogs and cookies to the rest of the school pupils during lunch period.




