

*The yearbook staff enjoyed preparing the 1951 Arms "Student" and sincerely hope you'll enjoy reading it.*



It is sincerely hoped that the accomplishments of the Student Council of each year will always be remembered because the Council shows democracy in action by the students themselves.





For an example, Robert Ward, a Senior, was a member of the state poultry judging team which attended the national F.F.A. convention at Kansas City, Missouri. Robert received the second highest award, a silver emblem, that was given at the contest, and he was the highest scoring individual on the state team.







Arms Academy BASKETBALL TEAM experienced a heartbreaking season on the hardwood during 1950-1951, winning four games out of a twenty-four game schedule.

Lack of height, of reserve strength and an unprecedented wave of illness and ineligibility among key players, all added to the problems of Coach Bob Jones, in his second year at the helm of the Trail-towners. However, there were several bright spots in an otherwise dismal season. The 1950-1951 edition amassed the highest number of points ever scored by an Arms five in history (1136), scored the most points ever tallied in a single game in Arms' history (74), and boasted one of the western Massachusetts high scorers in the brilliant Jonathan Snead, who also holds the individual Arms Academy record for points scored in a single game (31). Aided by promising freshman, Dudley Ferrari, seniors — John Kelleher, and Don Ward, and juniors — Harold Gould, and Roger Temple, the Arms squad performed ably in most cases, and it was seldom that the margin of victory gained by Hampshire League opponents was one-sided. The able backcourt stratagem of John Kelleher and the pivot play of Don Ward, along with other seniors Jim Mazanec and Don Lillpopp will be sorely missed next season.







Shelburne Historical Society


