To the Class of 1964:

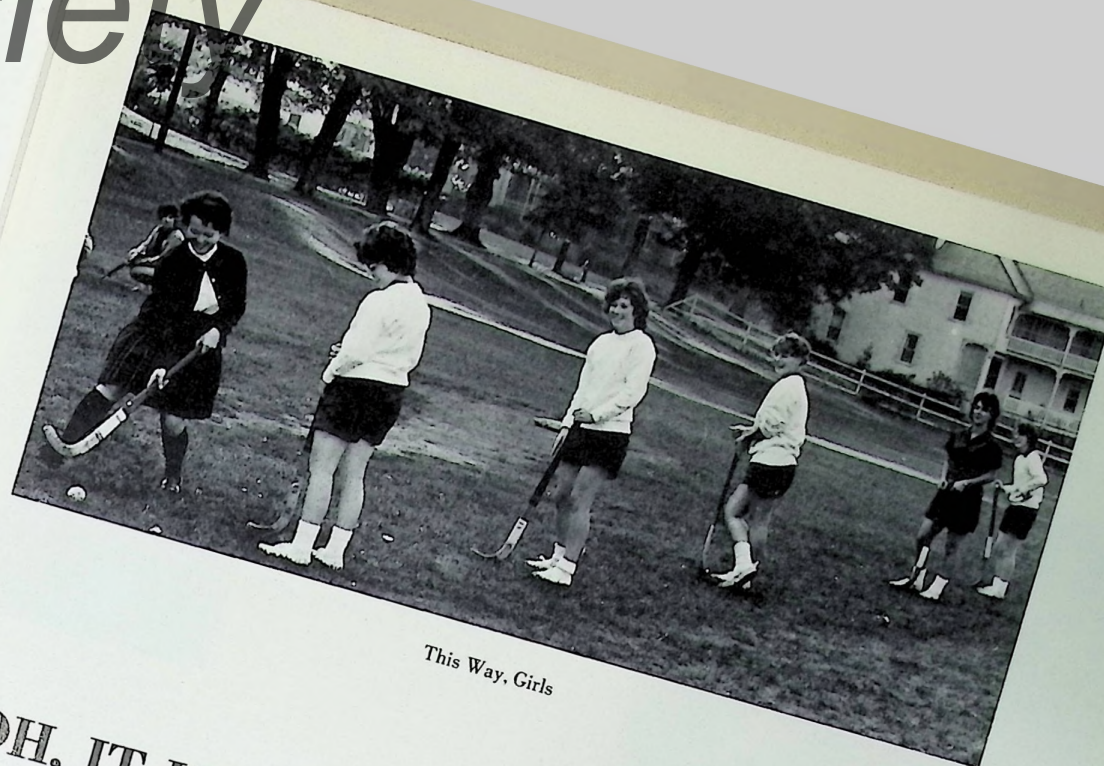

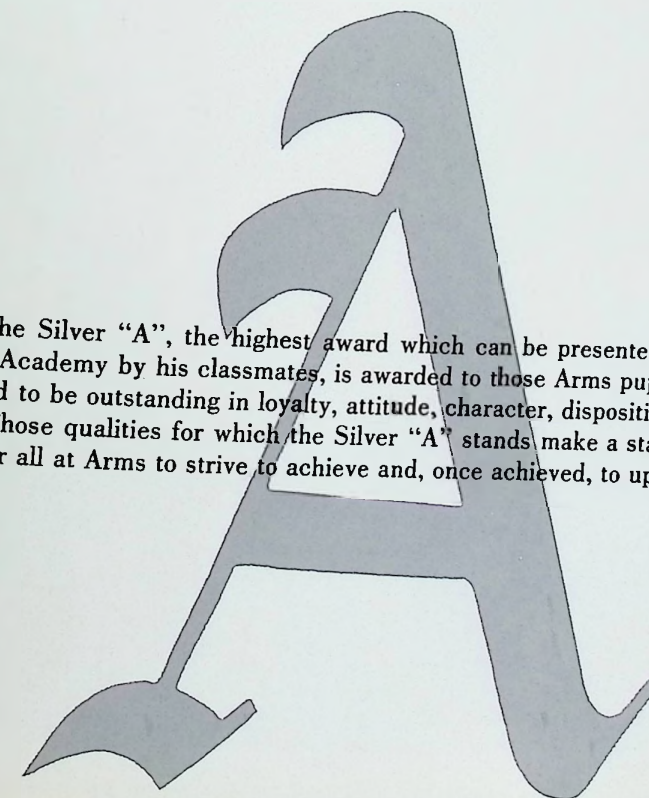

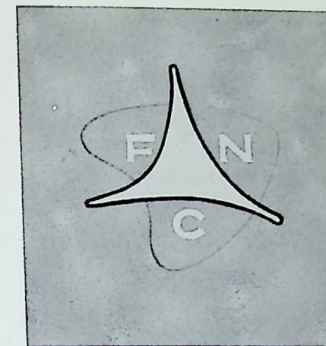

Varsity "A" Club

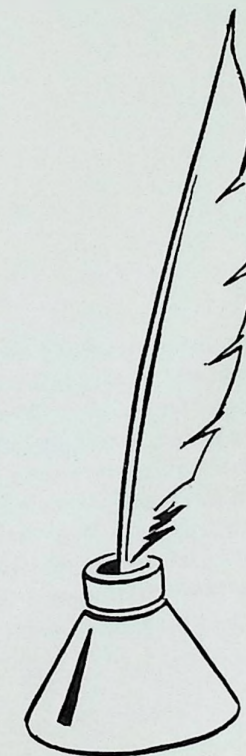

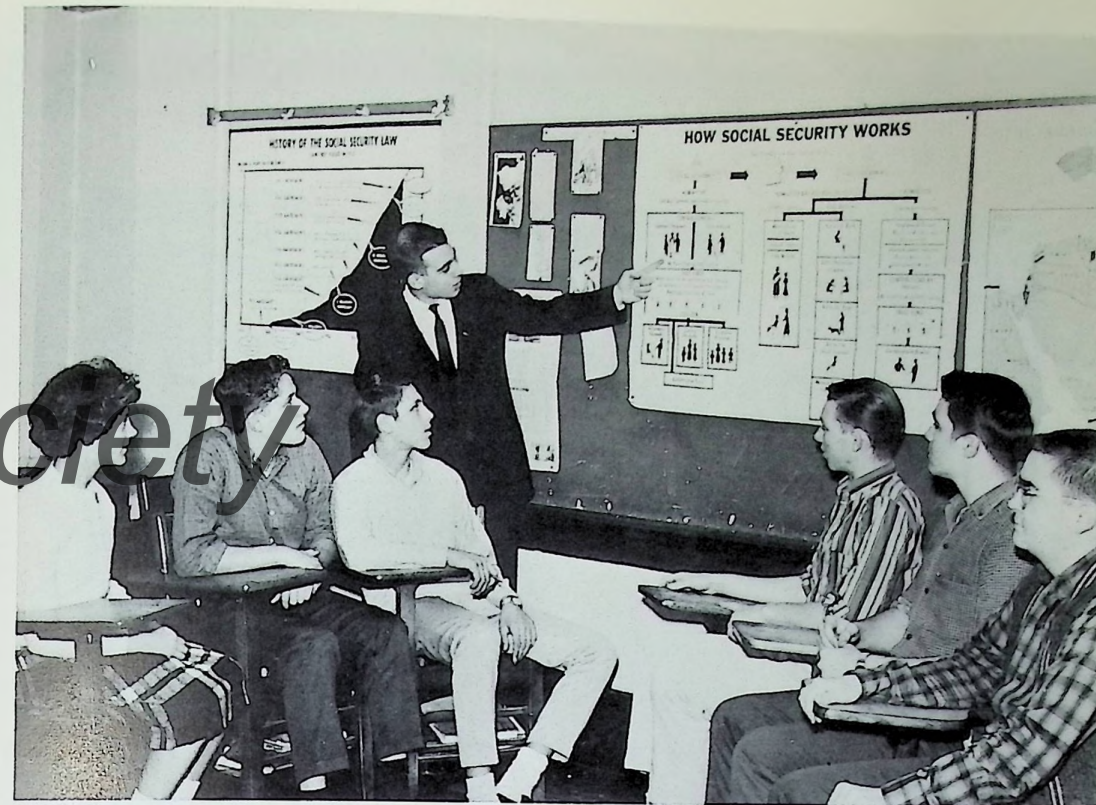
