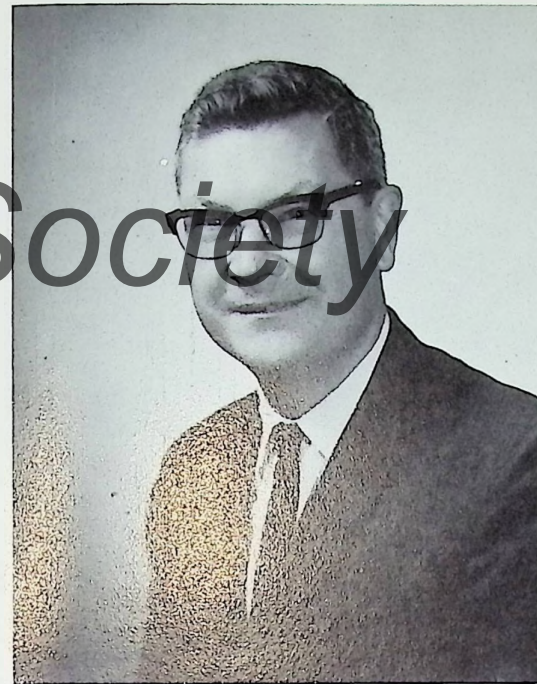
## GOVERNING BODY

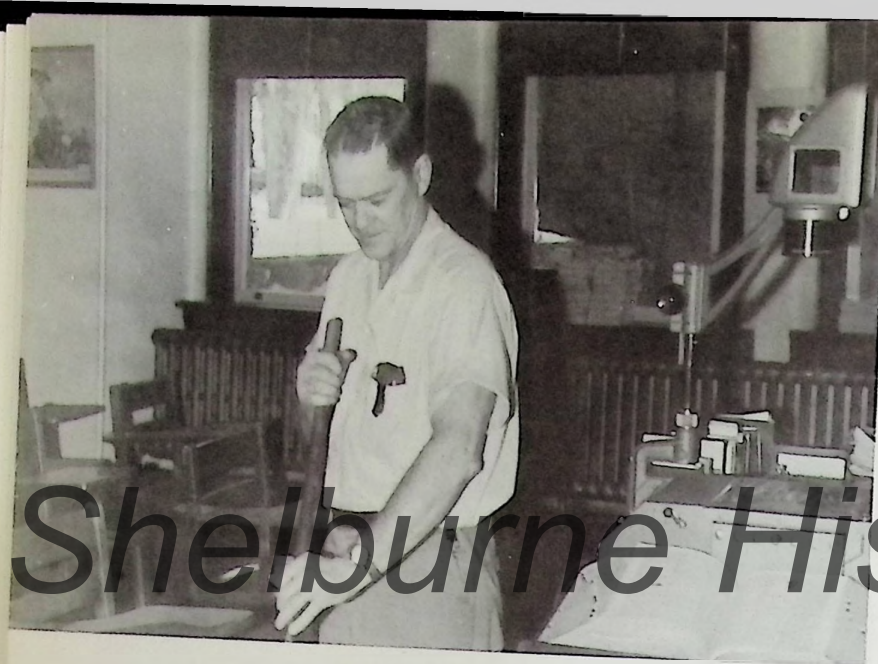
## Service With a Smile

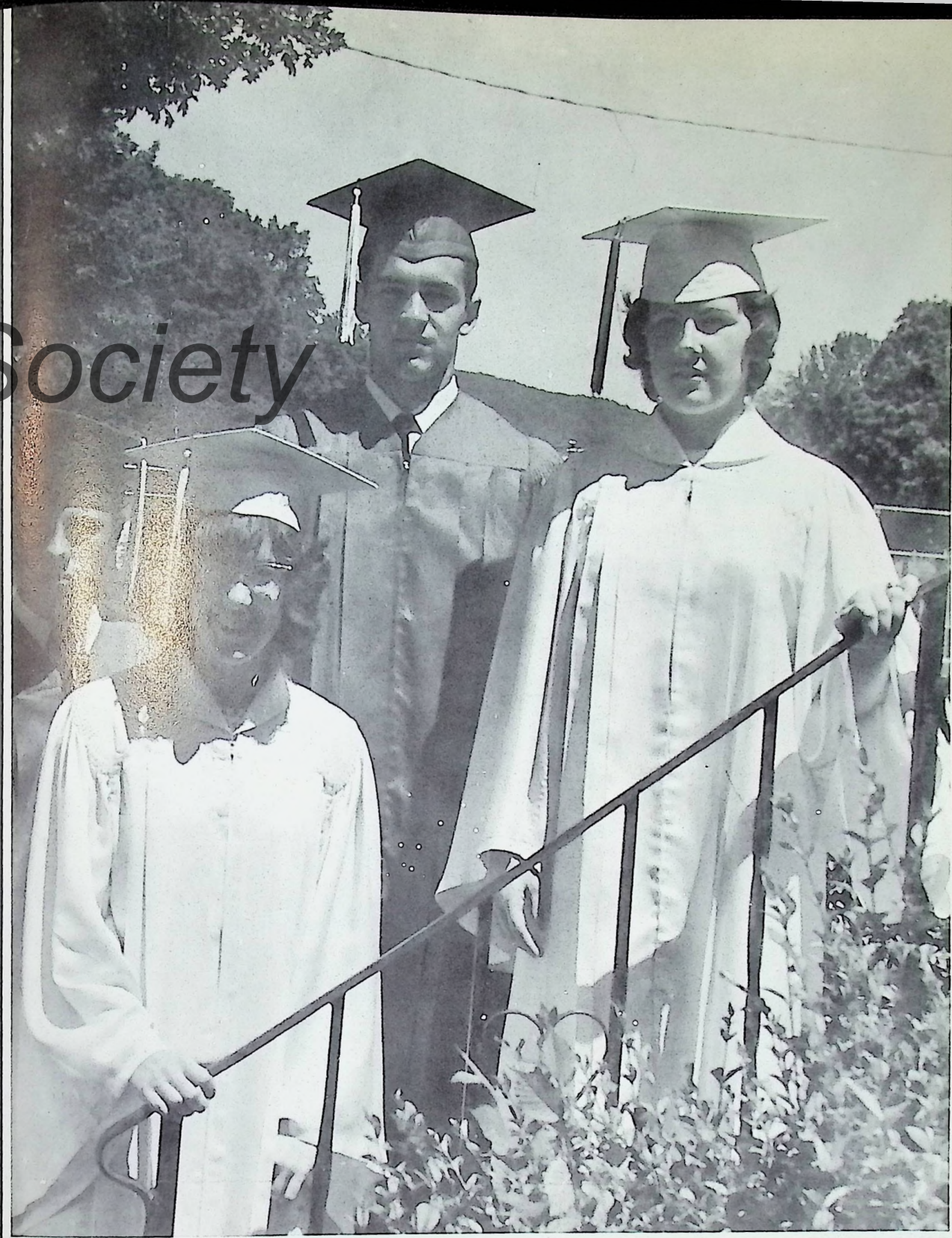
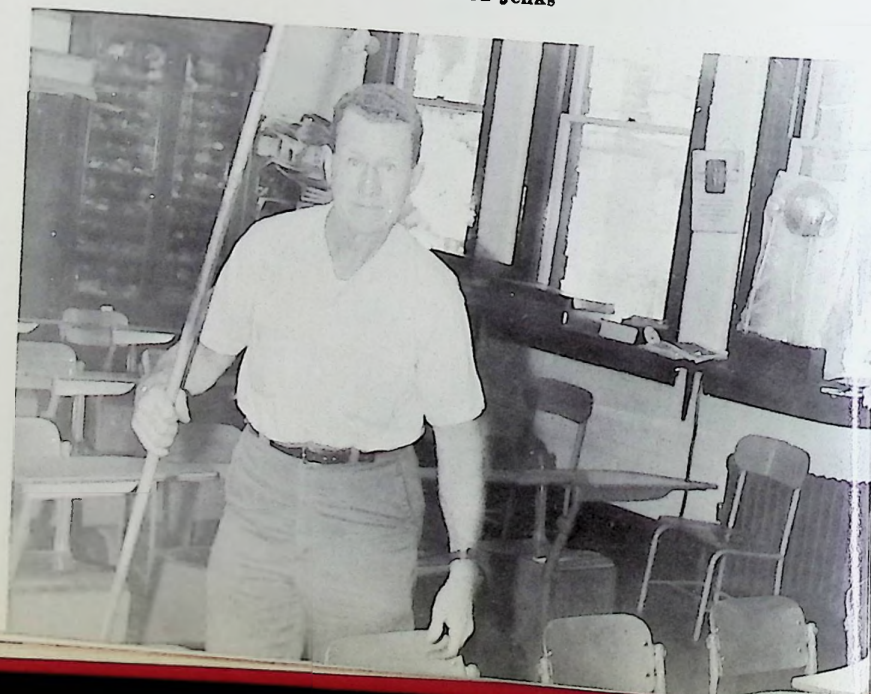
Who are those two gentlemen known to every student at Arms and regarded as personal friends by all? Why, our janitors, of course, Mr. Burnap and Mr. Jenks.

The junior varsity also completed a victorious season, winning nearly every contest they entered. Truly, this was a basketball season to be long remembered.



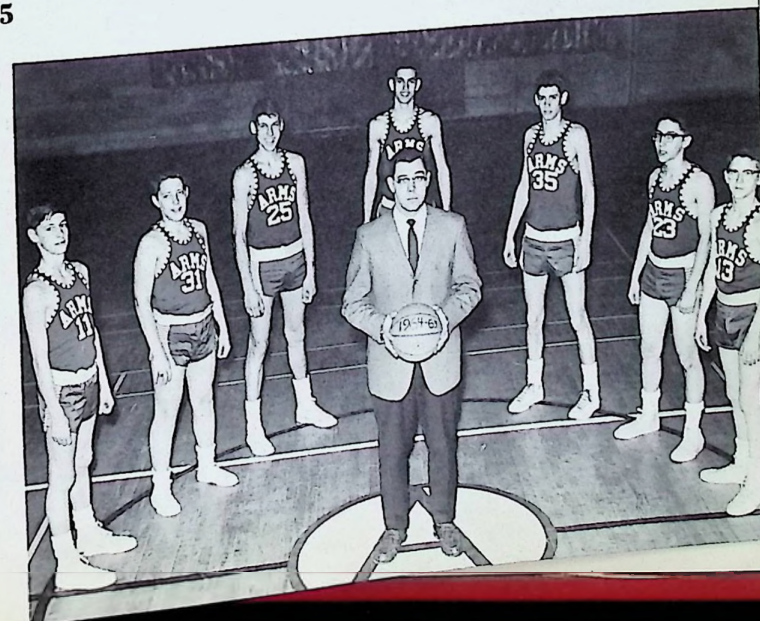
