#### STUDENTS HEAR POLITICAL DEBATE

Who will be our next president? This was the subject which was debated by Arms students in a special assembly on Monday, November 4. "Our purpose," said Chairman Norman Burnett, "is to put on a real political debate to help you know how to vote tomorrow."

Representing the Democrats were H. Chamberlain, M. Deveney, H. Dandeneau, and W. Dobias. The opposing Republicans were N. Williams, K. Schechterle, J. Davenport, and R. Haeberle. Speakers were limited to three minutes for the main speech and one minute for rebuttal. Mary Avery and Virginia Crafts were the timekeepers.

The stage was set up in traditional campaign style with campaign pictures of the party candidates prominently displayed. The speakers, except for K. Schechterle who is a member of Mr. Muir's problems class, were chosen from the history classes of Miss Burkill and Mr. Eldridge. The debate was directed by Mr. Eldridge. The new amplifying system was used for the program. Before the debate music was furnished by the Arms band.

#### WILLKIE AND SALTONSTALL CARRY ELECTION

Political enthusiasm in Arms rose to a high pitch on election morning, as it did in all parts of the country, as the students made known their preference for president and governor in a mock election, held in the reading room.

Wendell L. Willkie, republican nominee, took 202 votes to Franklin D. Roosevelt, third-term candidate's, 130 votes. Earl Browder, communist candidate, polled 3 votes. In the gubernatorial contest, Leverett H. Saltonstall came through with 229 votes to 104 votes cast for Paul A. Dever. These figures represent the vote of 93.6% of the student body.

Polls were open from 8:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M. with A. Wood, M. Mirick, C. Barry, and D. Geddis acting as ballot clerks, R. Haeberle, P. Coombs, H. Stafursky, G. Shippee, H. Shaw, A. Lunardi, A. Tirrell, and R. Bjork as watchers; and E. Miller, M. J. Johnson, R. Miller, and K. Herzig as counters. This election like the political rally was a project of the History and Problems of Democracy classes.
